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
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



The state of New York is currently facing a budget crisis and economic uncertainty that mirrors the financial problems that the rest of the nation faces this summer. One of the measures recently passed by the state legislature to keep the government running has been a reduction in healthcare spending. In an effort to make ends meet, the state has cut \$775 million in healthcare spending from its \$137 billion annual budget, a budget which at this time is over three months late. These cuts were passed as part of an emergency spending bill designed to ensure continued operation of the sate government and primarily focus on Medicaid and hospitals. 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
QCDS Well Represented at Recent GLIDM Meeting



CRESO Corner:

There is an alarming situation in many dental offices. There are many dentists and dental assistants who don't have familiarity with the radiation regulations in Article 175 of the New York City Health Code.

Section 175.04 requires that the owner of a radiation facility instruct all workers in the operating procedures applicable to work under the registration and in the health protection problems associated with exposure to radiation, and in precautions to minimize exposure.

The code section further states that a record of these instructions shall be maintained and is required annually. One portion of the regulation even states that a Health Department representative can privately interview a worker to see if they are familiar with these rules.

How many of you know the regulations for pregnant workers? Under what conditions should the x-ray unit not be operated? Have you instructed your staff where to stand during the x-ray exposure? Do you know that you have to see and hear that an exposure is being made? Have you instructed your staff how to position the cone? Have you instructed the staff about setting the proper techniques based on patient size? What about holding of patients during exposure?

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These and many more items need to be addressed and documented in order to comply with regulations. During a typical inspection by a CRESO or the City Health Department this topic will not be addressed. If a situation should arise at your facility, especially with a worker, this regulation will come up and if you have no documentation indicating that you have trained your staff at least once in radiation safety and the regulations, you will be dead in the water.

QCDS volunteers have once again shown their commitment to access to dental care by conducting a dental screening program at the Jackson Developmental Center located, in Jackson Heights. The center provides services for 3-5 year olds including special education classes, counseling services and speech, occupational and physical therapy. The children seemed quite excited at being screened in dental chairs on

the van. For many, this was their first dental experience. In a school of approximately 200 children, virtually all of the parents had completed the parental consent forms authorizing their child to participate in the screening. A number of children were found to be in need immediate dental care and appropriate referrals were made.

The principal, Irene Fernandez-Gomez, expressed thanks to QCDS and the volunteer dentists, noting the value of this screening program to the students. She indicated that the school helps to promote well-child care for students and encourages good health practices reinforced by programs of this nature.

These problems can easily be avoided by always mak-

ing sure that plan documents are properly prepared and executed. Conscientious follow-up is the secret to success. Unfortunately, we have come across numerous plan documents from retirement plan practitioners who have not learned this secret.

Document failures will become a major issue in the coming months. All defined contribution plans based on pre-approved documents, including Volume Submitter and Prototype plans, had to be completely restated for the EGTRRA legislation by April 30, 2010. The IRS has announced that there will be no extensions for the April 30 deadline. If the restatement

IRS Penalties

The penalties for a document failure can be severe. QCDS Continuing Education Forum a Success

A hot and humid Sunday did not prevent a large attendance at the recent Continuing Education Forum, held on June 6 at the World's Fair Marina Restaurant.

The program drew an enthusiastic crowd of 170 dentists not only from Queens, but from the entire metropolitan area, with three noteworthy speakers who addressed the attendees.

QCDS staff, as well as many volunteer leaders, handled the registration process.

The program opened with a presentation by Dr. Edward Feinberg, addressing the topic of treating teeth with insufficient clinical crowns. He noted that many of these teeth can be saved rather than extracted. He was followed by Dr. Lawrence Volland, an expert on the CDT, who provided many useful insights into the nuances of the proper use of the code in many common dental procedures performed in dental offices. The program concluded with Dr. Rekha Gehani addressing the issue of orthodontics being a factor in patient care and treatment. She noted that well aligned teeth can help achieve goals in the treatment of patients.

Many volunteer leaders were in attendance, including Drs. Chad Gehani, Mercedes Mota-Martinez, Ashok Dogra, Beatriz Vallejo, Prabha Krishnan, Sudhakar Shetty, Eric Huang, and Ronald Garrett.

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

TAX TIPS FOR DENTISTS

he IRS has suspended the mandatory withdrawal rules from pension plans and IRAs for 2009. You will not have to add the skipped payment to your 2010 withdrawal. Your 2010 withdrawal will be based on your age and December 31, 2009 balance. Inherited IRAs and pensions get the same break. If you turn 70.5 years of age in 2009, you needn't take any pension withdrawal
