Dental Community Welcomes Residents At Annual QCDS New Dentists' Forum

Nearly 50 dental residents were among an audience of more than 100 at the Queens County Dental Society's Annual New Dentists' program.

The event provides an opportunity for new dentists to meet with the leadership of the local dental community and explore the benefits of membership in organized dentistry. Residents and program chairs were invited from Queens-area hospitals.

The residents were welcomed by ADA Past President and current NYSDA Acting Executive Director Mark Feldman and QCDS President Prabha Krishnan. NYSDA Vice President Chad Gehani, recognized Dr. Gus Lasoff for his more than 65 years in organized dentistry calling it "a fine example" to residents beginning their careers. Dr. Lasoff is a founding member of QCDS and is an active member of the QCDS Board of Trustees. NYSDA Past President Steven Gounardes and Gabriele Libby, executive director of NCDS, were also in attendance.

NYSDA President-Elect Robert Doherty congratulated the new dentists, and enumerated a list of benefits that each new member would receive upon joining tri-partite organized dentistry (ADA, NYSDA, and QCDS), including a significant reduction in dues for several years if they join during their residency programs.

Several GPR program directors were present, including Dr.Bernard Shakter of Queens Hospital Center, Dr. Burton Wasserman of New York Hospital of Queens and Dr. Leonard Schiffman of Peninsula Hospital Center. The issue of non-licensees performing teeth whitening services in malls, spas and the like is finally showing some progress towards resolution. We are encouraged by legal decisions in other states, although not binding on New York courts, that have determined that these services do, in fact, constitute the practice of dentistry. NYSDA leadership has met with high level State Education Department representatives and the department has indicated a willingness to move forward on this issue, which we consider to be a matter of public safety. The wheels of government turn slowly but there is hope that this issue is finally being addressed, with the anticipated result that New York will follow suit with other states and confirm that teeth whitening constitutes the practice of dentistry.

We are also grateful to both State Education and the office of the Medicaid Inspector General for providing representatives to address our members regarding regulatory issues that can impact on them. George Ding, director of prosecutions for the Office of Professional Discipline and Michael Little, deputy Medicaid inspector general for the Bureau of Investigations and Enforcement, participated in our CE presentation on Sunday, April 5 and provided information to the attendees that will be useful in avoiding situations that can place their dental license and livelihood in jeopardy. Amy Kulb, a partner in a prominent local law firm that specializes in regulatory issues, also joined the panel and provided additional insights that are valuable to ensuring licensees are compliant with all areas of professional regulation.


The issue of "governance" relative to NYSDA is again being revisited, with a QCDS membership vote on this issue scheduled for our May 5 meeting. Overly simplified, the governance reform seeks to change the structure of NYSDA from a Board of Governors to a House of Delegates, modeled after the ADA structure, which would require a rewriting of the NYSDA constitution and by-laws. A more detailed overview can be found In the February issue of NYSDA News. In view of the importance of this issue, we urge all members to weigh in on this matter by casting their ballot at the May 5 meeting.

Many of you are probably aware of the recent closings of both St. John's Queens Hospital and Mary Immaculate Hospital. While both hospitals will be missed in the communities they served, the dental residents at Mary Immaculate avoided a serious situation with their program being terminated prior to completion of their program. Quick action coordinated with the ADA resulted in these residents being

incorporated into the programs at Brookdale University Hospital and at Wyckoff Heights Medical Center, thus avoiding a real nightmare for them. Fittingly, QCDS honored Dr. David Miller at our recent resident night program for his 24 years of service to hospital dentistry at Mary Immaculate. We wish him well in his new position at Wyckoff Heights Medical Center.

I would also like to recognize our QCDS volunteers who are responding to the many requests I get from schools to do educational presentations or dental screenings for their students. Dr. Mark Molinsky started a group of 80 first graders at PS 214 in Flushing on the path to good oral health habits by providing an age appropriate presentation explaining brushing, flossing, choosing good foods and other good oral health habits which the students can use to prevent future problems. In addition, the usual "goodies" of toothbrushes, floss, informational coloring books and literature for the parents was provided. We thank Ms. Bondy, a first grade teacher, as well as Ms. Goldberg, the principal, for the invitation and the opportunity to be of service. Similar upcoming programs involve other QCDS dental volunteers and we can always use more help.

allow others to advance. Becoming chairman emeritus has not curtailed his counsel and keen interest in the excellent program he has created.

Dr. Orlian, a graduate of New York University College of Dentistry, served as a captain in the United Air Force for two years before completing a residency in oral surgery at the Queens General Hospital. He was board certified in the specialty in 1963. He holds fellowships of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, American Society of Dental Anesthesiologists and the American Society of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons. His (dental) honors include OKU, and he is a fellow of the American College of Dentist.

Opening a practice limited to oral surgery in Flushing, Dr. Olian joined the medical staff at Flushing Hospital shortly becoming Chairman of Dentistry. He oversaw the growth of an infant dental residency program into an enviable form adopted by other institutions in the City of New York. His resourcefulness and organizational skills led to the advisory body of the Medical Staff Society. Dr. Orlian was elected President of the Medical Board from 1985 to 1987 and became a Trustee and Member of the Executive Committee from 1989 to the present. Flushing Hospi-

tal conferred its L.P. Pederson M. D. Memorial Award on him in October, 1995, followed a year later by its prestigious Leadership Award. To be chosen to receive the United Hospital Fund Distinguished Trustee Award in 2004 was a sign of Dr. Orlian's worth to Flushing Hospital and the community it served.

Throughout his leadership roles in the Queens County Dental Society he has singularly encouraged foot soldiers, as described in the 2000 July/August QCDS Bulletin "President's Message" and reprinted in the September 2000ADA News. His genuine interest in colleagues he mentored is demonstrated by the following who rose to the presidency of QCDS: Joseph Caruso, Stephen Quarcoo, Alan Winik, Chad Gehani, Viren Jhaveri, Prabha Krishnan, Ashok Dogra and Bijan Anvar.

Dr. Orlian has published many articles in dental and professional journals. He has lectured at The Greater Long Island and Greater New York Dental Meetings, N.Y.U.C.D. Post-graduate Education, QCDS, National Asian Indian Dental Convention (Principal Speaker, December 1986 and 1989) and Queens Academy of General Dentistry. He has also conducted hands-on clinics at Flushing Hospital in conjunction with QCDS.





'Red Flags Rule' Goes Into Effect May 1

rew federal regulations designed to deter identity theft go into ef-fect May 1, 2009 The regulations fect May 1, 2009. The regulations, called "the Red Flags Rule," apply to dental offices.

An article was published about the Rule in the January 2009 issue of The New York State Dental Journal, and the American Dental Association has continued its efforts to exempt dental offices from the regulations. The ADA has also published information at www.ada.org.

If the new regulations are not postponed, your practice will need to write new policy procedures, train staff and confirm your business associates comply with identity theft rules so that your practice is compliant with the new Rules.

While we continue to oppose these regulations, we also want to be sure you have the information needed to comply with the

law. The American Dental Association and the New York State Dental Association are pleased to provide our members with free resources, as a member benefit, to help them establish office policies and comply with the rule.

The guidelines and sample policy and procedures outline can save dental practices many hours, as well as legal fees that would probably otherwise be necessary to meet the requirements. It is part of our commitment to you to make your professional lives easier and more rewarding. This material is available to you now for downloading from the members-only section at www.nysdental.org or www.ada.org.

ADA will continue its efforts to represent you in Washington in seeking modification of this Rule to exclude dental practices as well as to stand up for you on issues that can affect your practice.

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Why Are My Colleagues Reviewing **My Malpractice Claim?**

One of the hazards of this profession is that patients can file lawsuits against you for the treatment, or lack thereof, you provided them. That's why most dentists maintain professional liability insurance coverage, also known as malpractice insurance. Although there is no legal requirement by the State of New York to have this coverage, virtually all dentists have the insurance to protect themselves and their practice. In addition, most dental benefit companies require it if you are one of their participating providers.

If you are actually served with a malpractice claim and you are insured by a policy endorsed by NYSDA or its component societies, your claim will be processed through the NYSDA Professional Liability Claims Review Program. This program has been in effect since 1975 and is administered by the NYSDA Council on Insurance and implemented by subcommittees of the Council within each component. Hence the nickname "District Claims."

The essential purpose of the claims review function is to have these local committees of peers review malpractice cases and tell the insurer whether to settle or defend it.

And just why would an insurer listen to a group of dentists who tell them how to handle a malpractice claim? Normally they would not. Insurance companies manage risk through underwriting and claims management, so they are generally not willing to relinquish those functions to someone else. The only reason companies would agree to this is under the condition of an association endorsement. For example, NYSDA's agreement with Medical Liability Mutual Insurance Company states, "NYSDA Professional Liability Claims Committees will review and make determinations regarding individual claims pursuant to policy provisions consistent with past practice and procedures in accordance with the NYSDA Professional Liability Claims Review Guidelines..."

That's a very hard statement for an insurance company to agree to because claims management is an essential part of how a company manages its risk. It is the price they pay, however, for our association endorsement and, in turn, it is the benefit our members reap through this partnership. Each policy issued

under the NYSDA-MLMIC Professional Liability program carries this provision:

"... the Company will not settle a Claim without the written consent of a majority of the members of your component Society's District Claims Committee of the New York State Dental Association. The decision of this Committee is binding on both

Most insurance companies are loath to defend most of the professional liability claims they receive, especially smaller claims, since the defense costs can often exceed the claim demand. Without the Claims Review Program in effect, that's often what most insurers would urge a policyholder to do. Even though a policy may provide stipulation, "... no claim will be settled without the consent of you the insured...," the insured *—Continued on page 18*

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obtaining proper informed consent.

The audience was also addressed by Mirsade Markovic, legal counsel to MLMIC. She identified the three factors that may result in a malpractice action: the presence of a doctor/patient relationship, a breach of duty and resulting injury.

Dr. Chad Gehani then spoke on issues relating to practice

management and told of experiences from his many years of endodontic experience.



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is seldom in a good position to exercise this right. Often the insurer paints an awful picture of the prospects for the case and cites the negative opinions of their own claims department experts in urging settlement


With the Claims Review Program, the decision is taken out of the hands of the insurer and insured. A group of independent dentists will review the facts of the case and interview the dentist and a representative of the insurer (often an attorney. In accordance with the Program Guidelines, they provide an, "objective, clear, reasoned and impartial review." Removed from the decision-making are the bias of the insurer and the emotion of the defendant. The result is likely the best possible manner to proceed for the member.

"That's all great, but why can't I avoid the aggravation, and just have the company pay the claim if that's what they want to do anyway? It won't cost me anything."

Well, actually it will. Though the insurance company will pay the settlement amount, the effects of settling a defensible claim are many. They include:

- Automatic reporting to the National Practitioner Data Bank
- Claims history that may jeopardize future insurability
- Automatic reporting of the settlement to the State Office of Professional Discipline and
- Claims history that may jeopardize participation in some dental benefit plans

Certainly there are many instances when claims should indeed be settled. The problem is settling claims that should be defended and thus suffering the consequences outlined. The Claims Review process may cause some stress, but the risk of settling a defensible claim will likely cause much more than that. And, most members who were initially reluctant to undergo the process often ended up finding the experience to be collegial and informative.

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
