# 2015 World's Fair of Dentistry Is Largest Event In Queens County Dental Society History

For the third year in a row, the Queens County Dental Society ran the World's Fair of Dentistry at Terrace on the Park. The event ran for two days from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Dentists and dental professionals from all over the tri-state region were able to earn 16 Continuing Education credits. They had the opportunity to meet with and learn from nearly 60 vendors. The event also provided an excellent networking opportunity for those in attendance especially during the catered breakfast and lunch.

Admissions was open to all dentists, not just those who are members of the American Dental Association. "This was a wonderful opportunity for us to show the value of organized dentistry to those who are not members and to hopefully convince them of the importance of joining the tri-partite," said Dr. Doron Kalman, chairman of the World's Fair of Dentistry Committee. Dr. Kalman served as the master of ceremonies on both days.

Attendance at this year's event was much higher than in previous years. "We had over 430 people in attendance on Saturday and over 450 people on Sunday. It was by far the biggest dental event in Queens's history," said Oleg Rabinovich, QCDS Executive Director.

Admission to the World's Fair of Dentistry was \$100 for one day and \$160 for both days. However, admissions was free to dental residents and dental students. "It's very important to have the next generation of dentists included in the tri-partite so we invited them free of charge" said Dr. Jay Ledner, World's Fair of Dentistry Committee Member.

From IPads to gift certificates to New York Jets tickets and dental equipment, nearly 60 items were raffled throughout the two day event. New this year was —*Continued on page* 12

# Soda, Sugar and Your Patients

The New York Times article entitled, "Hard Times for Soft Drinks" brought some welcome news to the many stakeholda decade. Dentists have also been paying close attention to the effects of sugary soft drinks for some time.

In 2012, New York's then-Mayor Bloomberg tried but failed to bring in a law to cap most fountain drink sizes. Anti-obesity campaigners in Philadelphia, San Francisco and other cities failed to implement soda taxes as well. "Even as anti-obesity campaigners have failed to pass taxes, they have accomplished something larger. In the course of the fight, they have reminded people that soda is not a very healthy product. They have echoed similar messages coming from public health researchers and others, and fundamentally changed the way Americans think about soda," the article states.

While soft drink consumption increased dramatically in the United States from the 1960s through 1990, it was in the 1990s while the "up-

sizing" phenomenon was happening that obesity, diabetes and other weight related health issues grew. The increase in the consumption of soft drinks had also led to a decrease in dairy consumption among children and adolescents, which increased the risk for dental caries and a host of systemic complications.

The American Academy of Pediatric Dentists has been highly critical of soft drinks and has encouraged schools to offer bottled water and other healthy choices in vending machines instead of sugary drinks. The campaign seems to be showing results as fewer people are drinking sodas that are full of sugar and artificial ingredients and that water is fast becoming the beverage of choice. The article also sheds light on how recent studies show a serious and sustained decline in the changing consumption of beverages among children and adolescents. From 2004 to 2012, children consumed 79 fewer sugar-sweetened beverage calories a day, according to a large government survey, representing a 4 percent cut in calories overall. As total calorie intake

has declined, obesity rates among school age children appear to have leveled off.

light healthy foods and adopting one of the country's strictest menu-labeling laws, radio and television ads encouraging parents to think twice about serving sugary drinks to their children have all paid off. For many public health advocates, soda has become "the new tobaccoa toxic product to be banned, taxed and stigmatized," the article states. Worried about falling sales, the big soda companies are fighting back by increasing marketing, lobbying and philanthropy efforts. As a new culture of health is booming, the industry is trying to adapt to the recent trends in consumer beverage choices by coming out with beverages with "real sugar" instead of high-fructose corn syrup, smaller can sizes, and replacing C.S.D.'s or "carbonated soft drinks," with healthier or natural products.

"There will always be soda, but I think the era of it being acceptable for kids to drink soda all day long is passing slowly," said Marion Nestle, a professor of nutrition at New York University.

staffer told a QCDS member about a recurring "cyst" that was again causing her discomfort, and had the area examined by a QCDS oral surgeon. She was referred for follow-up. Fortunately, none of those screened this year evidenced suspicious lesions that required further referral.

Voluntary screening programs, especially to under-served children, are incredibly valuable to help spot problems early. Partnering with local groups like the Mets allows the dentists of QCDS to reach more people over a short period of time. QCDS members can easily educate people about the importance of oral cancer screenings and regular checkups.

Each year in the United States 35,000 people are diagnosed with oral cancer and 8,000 people die from the disease. Suspicious lesions are often discovered during these voluntary screening programs. "If you catch it early, like a routine dental visit, there's an 80-90 percent survival rate and that's just from a painless two minute screening at the dentist" said Dr. Kesner about oral cancer.

Along with the screenings, toothbrushes, informational pamphlets, and Mets key chains were distributed to the attendees. With the Mets having done much better this year, nearly 100 fans were screened and hundreds of fans were given information.

Dr. Kesner's team included dental residents from Jamaica Hospital and Brookdale Hospital, as well as practicing QCDS dentists and his own office staff. More than 30 dentists and dental residents participated this year, including Dr. Kesner, his staff members Juliette and Ana; Dr. Neil Cohen; Dr. Dan Levitt; Dr. James Keenan; Dr. Walter Sabolboro; Dr Alan Queen; Dr. Benjamin Solomowitz; Dr. Jessica Figueroa; Dr. Charlene Berkman; Dr. Mitchell Greenberg, Dr. Boris Arbitman; Dr. Robert Olan; Dr. Ira Schwartz; and Oleg Rabinovich, QCDS Executive Director.

Thankfully, the Mets defeated the Colorado Rockies 3-0, so everyone was a winner on the day of the screening.
